THE ROLE OF THE ARRHYTHMIA NURSE

Many of you may wonder what the Arrhythmia Nurses do all day! If ever you call us, the phone always goes to answer phone, and when you get a call back it may be as late as 7 o'clock at night. We do not keep the usual hours of specialist nurses as ours is a rather unique role

The Arrhythmia Nurse Service commenced in March 2005, and the first ICD's were implanted at RBH in April 2005. Since then over 400 ICD's have been implanted. With other ICD patients moving to the area, there are quite a lot of you to keep us busy. Here is an idea of things we get up to.

Prior to ICD implant one of the Arrhythmia Nurses will spend time with the patient and their family explaining in depth what the procedure entails. Different people have these put in for different reasons so many patients need time spent psychologically preparing for this procedure. For some, driving implications affect their work practices and this can understandably have a big impact on their lives. As you are aware we also provide the buddy service and this can help our patients enormously; to be able to talk to someone who has already lived through this experience.

Following implant we prepare the patient for discharge and provide more information. We try and give small amounts of information at a time, so we are not bombarding you with too much, but there is a lot to get through. There is also an ICD check carried out at this time

A week after discharge, we call patients with new implants to see how they are coping at home, and then we see them in clinic at one month to check the wound is healed and life is getting back to normal.

After that we see you if you want us to. When there are any concerns or wound issues or if you experience a shock; then we help you through that difficult time, guiding and supporting; or when you go on holiday and want to know your nearest centre, we can help.

We don't just look after patients with ICDs. We also care for patients with rhythm disturbances. We see them prior and post procedure, providing education and support and discharging them home when ready. These patients also require a lot of support prior to and after their procedures, with various tests that we oversee.

As part of an ever-expanding area of cardiology we are involved in setting up new clinics, as Pete explains in this newsletter, and developing our role further. We are involved in audit, research, maintenance of protocols and databases, and teaching of other members of the RBH team. We often have student nurses working alongside us. When you are having a procedure with one of our consultants, the arrhythmia nurses are the ones who arrange which day you are coming in.

So, when you give us a call and it goes to answer phone, please be patient with us, we will get back to you as soon as we can!

REMINDER OF WHAT TO DO IF YOU EXPERIENCE A SHOCK

Some patients experience palpitations or feel dizzy or light-headed before they receive a shock. If this happens to you, inform someone that you are feeling unwell and sit or lie down.

You may collapse from your abnormal heart rhythm and come round a short while later having received a shock.

Or you may feel unwell due to your abnormal heart rhythm and receive a shock while conscious. In both of these situations the ICD is functioning appropriately. In these circumstances please contact the Arrhythmia Nurse Specialists (within normal office hours) so that we can arrange for you to come in to the clinic to have the ICD checked and for us to be able to review exactly what happened. If this occurs at night or at the weekend and you do not feel unwell, you may wait until the next day or the Monday morning before contacting us.

You may receive a shock without feeling any symptoms in which case you need to contact the Arrhythmia Nurse Specialists (within normal office hours) or attend the Casualty Department if this occurs out of office hours.

This needs to be done as soon as possible as in these circumstances it may be the ICD has

delivered a shock inappropriately and it needs to be checked.

In any circumstance, if you continue to feel unwell following a shock or if you are given more than one shock, dial 999 for an ambulance. It is very important to take your ICD card with you whenever you attend hospital. If the hospital is not the Royal Bournemouth Hospital please make sure the staff contact us to let us know you have had a shock.
