# **ICDs AND SPRINT FIDELIS LEADS**

Some of you will have a Sprint Fidelis defibrillator lead (that is manufactured by a company called Medtronic). This lead connects the ICD box (or 'generator') to one of the chambers of your heart. In common with all pacemaker and ICD leads there is the small possibility of a fracture of the lead occurring which could lead to a malfunction of the system. This is a very rare event but has been found to be a little more common than usual with the Fidelis lead. Malfunction of an ICD could result in inappropriate pacing or shock therapy being delivered to the heart when there is no heart rhythm disturbance and/or a failure to pace the heart when it needs to be paced.

People with this particular lead have all been contacted and given a special kind of magnet to carry around with them all of the time. They have been issued with special instructions of when to use the magnet and avoid potential problems that can result from the Fidelis lead. The story below relates to life with a magnet.

# LIFE WITH THE NEW MAGNET

On the 31st of December I went for my ICD check and was given a magnet to carry with me at all times. After getting my head around the serious side of the magnet next came the funny side! However, when I turned around there was only a little elderly man behind me. I then realised my bag was attached to the display unit and as I went to pull my bag away the display unit came with it. We then went to the bank where I caused more chaos- the cashier took my pass book then promptly asked if I had any problems before using it as the magnetic strip was wiped clean- oops my magnet again!!!

A few days later hubby was rushed to hospital. I went with him in the ambulance. Lo and behold my bag got stuck on the metal bar of the bed. The paramedic said "What have you got in there?" My reply was "Don't worry only a magnet!" We then arrived at Bournemouth hospital. When in A & E my magnet struck again, this time causing chaos to another bed!

Couple of weeks later hubby lost a screw down the back of the washing machine whilst he was mending it and couldn't reach it I said "Don't panic" and out came my magnet- problem solved!

This all happened in the first month of having the magnet - now my magnet and I are trying to behave ourselves!
